Simple Facts

- •Good drinking water is free from disease-causing organisms, harmful chemical substances, and radioactive matter. It tastes good and looks good.
- Less than 1 % of the world's freshwater on Earth is readily available for human world consumption.
- •90 % of persistent organic pollutants come from the atmosphere.
- •70 % of the world's surface is covered by water, only 2.5 % is freshwater and of that over 1 % is frozen ice.

Lake Superior 2003

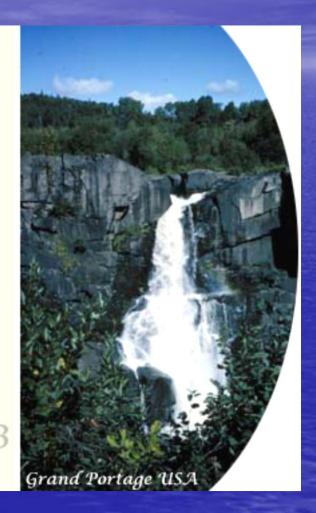
First Annual Women's Water Walk took place in the Spring of 2003.

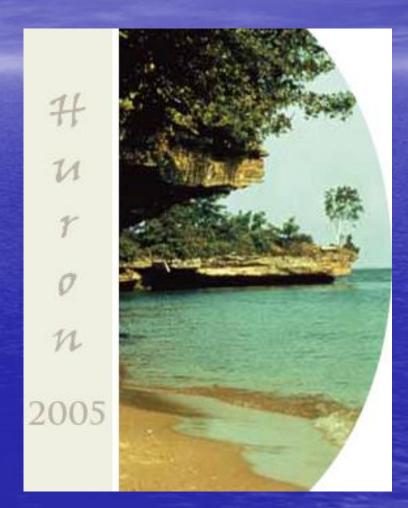




Lake Huron 2005

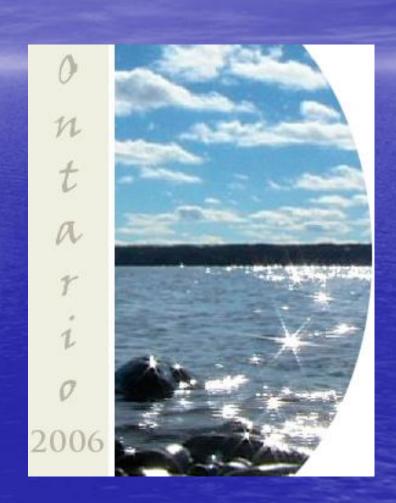




Lake Ontario 2006

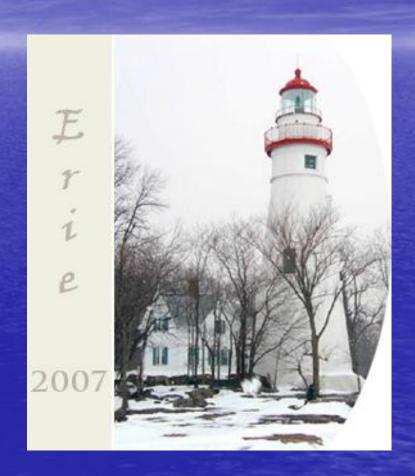




Lake Erie 2007

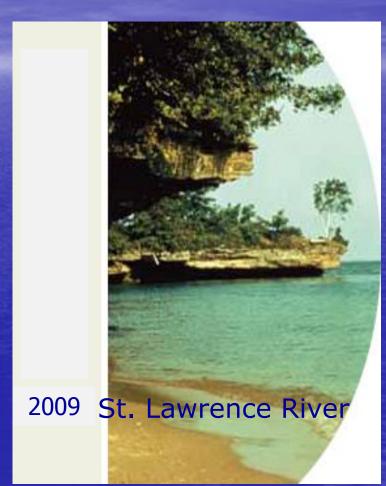




St. Lawrence River

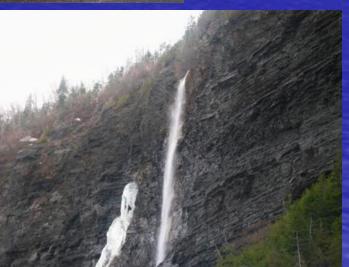














The originality of this idea is uncommon as there are few who are ready and willing to take on such a challenge.
